Health Officer

Nature of Work:

This position is administrative in nature. The duties of the Health Officer include administrative functions, communicable disease control, environmental health protection and nuisance control, and other duties as needed. The general duties of the Health Officer apply to complaints, nuisances, and threats that might result in any conditions or behavior that can reasonably be expected to place others at significant risk of exposure to infection with a communicable disease.

Some aspects of this position are required by Maine law Title 22 Maine Revised Statutes Annotated (M.R.S.A.)

The Health Officer is a public health official appointed for a three year period and responsible to the Board of Selectmen (BOS). The Health Officer is subject to the supervision and direction of the Commissioner of Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) with the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS).

Essential Duties and Responsibilities:

Duties as stated in Maine law title 22 M.R.S.A. 454-A, within jurisdictional limits, a local health officer must:

- * Make and keep a record of all proceedings, transactions, ordinances, orders and rules acted upon by the local health officer.
- * Report to the Commissioner of Maine CDC or the Commissioner's designee facts that relate to communicable diseases and cases of communicable disease as required by the DHHS rules.
- * During a declared health emergency, as defined in section 802, subsection 2 and 2-A, report to the Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee facts regarding potential notifiable diseases and cases that_directly relate to the declared health emergency, as the rules of DHHS require.
- * Receive and examine the nature of complaints made by members of the public concerning conditions posing a public health threat or a potential public health threat.
- * With the consent of the owner, agent or occupant, enter, inspect and examine any place or premises where filth, whether or not the cause of sickness, or conditions posing a public health threat are known or believed to exist. An agent with special expertise appointed by the local health of-

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may inspect and examine the place or premises. If entry is refused, the local health officer shall apply for an inspection warrant from the District Court, pursuant to Title 4, section 179, prior to conducting the inspection.

- * After consulting with the commissioner or the commissioner's designee, order the suppression and removal of nuisances and conditions suspected of posing or found to pose a public health threat.
- * Act as a resource for connecting residents with the public health services and resources provided by the Maine CDC.
- * Enforce all state laws and rules of DHHS, and call for assistance of law enforcement officer if necessary.
- Provide an annual report to the BOS of all complaints received and actions taken in capacity as Health Officer.
